LA Art Show Supports #blacklivesmatter


Each year the LA Art Show is honored to present as part of the DIVERSEartLA Platform, projects that support black artists, collectors, curators and institutions.

The Robert E. Holmes Collection, “A Black Man in the World,” presented at the LA Art Show in 2019, reflects our commitment to presenting such focused diversity in our programming.

Holmes has said he considers himself “a citizen of the world.” Accordingly, his art collection is a reflection of his life and times. Showcasing the legacy of both colonial oppression by Europeans in Africa, the Caribbean, and Central and South America, and the history of slavery in the United States, art has historically perpetuated a distorted perception of Black people as they have moved, or been forced to move, throughout the world.



Holmes says, “As one steps out of the manner in which he is perceived, challenges widely held perceptions about the Black body, travels throughout the world and accumulates broad interests, that accumulated knowledge and experience can lift one out of seeing and being seen in a purely racial context.”

At the 2017 LA Art Show, Carlos Martiel performed his work, “Cauce/Riverbed,” in which the artist dramatized the significant challenges faced by immigrants in California and the United States at large.

The murders of Black people have again risen to global and national attention, and a centuries-long outrage in the United States has re-erupted. Unfortunately our society has built a social, economic and legal system that supports systemic racism, rooted on our collective history of genocide and enslavement. Martiel wants us to open our eyes wide and remember that colonization system domination, slavery and subjugation are the strongest words written in universal history. The artist analyzes today these old practices and systems devalue and denigrate the lives and souls of Black people.
